Leeds United Ladies v Charlton Athletic Women

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Formed in 1989, Leeds United Ladies has been one of the country's top women's sides for most of the last decade.

After seven years playing in the Yorkshire & Humberside league, the season 1997/98 saw the first team gain promotion to the AXA FA Northern Premier League. After consolidating and adjusting to National league football for a couple of seasons they then achieved promotion as champions of the Northern Premier League, the same season also saw them play in the semi finals of the Women's FA Cup for the first time. They then gained promotion in 2001/02 to the FA National League where they finished a very credible fourth.

2003/04 saw the team once again in fourth place, and the highest placed team outside London. In 2004/05 the team finished fifth, while 2005/06 saw the team achieve its first appearance in the Women's FA Cup final.

2006/07 was an up and down season with Leeds topping the table over the Christmas period and getting through to the Premier League Cup Final, when they narrowly lost 1-0 in the 90th minute against Arsenal and eventually finished fifth in the league.

Over the summer of 2007 the youth teams amalgamated with the Leeds United Girls Centre of Excellence to form one organisation feeding into the open age team.

The club had several members of the first squad who had progressed through from the youth teams, including England regulars Gemma Bonner and Jess Clarke, Sophie Walton, Olivia Thackray and Mel Sutcliffe.

Rick Passmoor was appointed Manager in July 2007, and brought in new signings including Steph Houghton, Carly Telford, Katie Holtham and Jade Moore, while the partnership with Leeds Metropolitan University brought in players such as Emma Higgins from Northern Ireland.

In 2008, Carla Cantrell and Ellen White arrived, while the summer of 2009 saw the arrival of Nat Staneff, Laura Bassett and Remi Allen.

The blend of home-grown talent with regular England internationals saw the club have its most successful period ever. As well as the Premier League Cup win against Everton in 2010, and a second FA Cup Final appearance in 2008, the club was made Club of the Year in the 2010 Leeds Sports Federation Awards and finished fourth, just three points and a few goals away from Europe. Rick Passmoor deservedly collected the Premier League Manager of the Season award from the FA.

But the successes of 2009-10 came against the backdrop of the end of the partnership with Leeds Metropolitan University, the club having its funding and Super League application withdrawn in January 2010, just two weeks before that Premier League Cup Final win.

In July 2010, the club re-adopted the Leeds United Ladies name when it was taken under the wing of the Leeds United Foundation, but is now independently funded by local businesses and people - such as our Chairman, Steve Russell - with a genuine interest in women's football. Reserves manager Gemma Grainger stepped up to run the first team, but with results going against the club Rick Passmoor came back for the second half of a difficult transitional season.

Despite having a young and inexperienced squad, the club eventually finished fourth in the eight-team league and won the County Cup for the sixth time in the past ten years.

One of the people Rick brought to the bench was former coach Chris Welburn, and in the summer of 2011 he was appointed manager. His work in building up the squad and taking it to greater heights has already begun, with key signings in Sarah Danby, Emma Johnson, Billie Murphy, Amy Turner and Vanessa Holmes - and more to follow.

1. Jules Draycott

Goalkeeper
Born 15 July 1992
Jules stepped into the first team having helped the reserves retain both league and county cup titles in 2008-09. She has represented England at Under-17 level, including at the World Cup in 2008 and is a Centre of Excellence graduate.



2. Emma Coates

Defender
Born 29 April 1991
Emma is another Leeds player who came through from the reserves. Sadly she spent most of the last 12 months recovering from an injury but she's now working her way back into contention.



3. Stacey Emmonds

Defender
Born 28 November 1986
Stacey is one of the many graduates from Leeds United who move away to gain experience elsewhere, and has already made that experience count since rejoining Leeds last summer. Her season was curtailed by injury but she is once again back in contention.



4. Hayley Sharp

Defender
Born: 12 November 1990
Hayley is another 'prodigal daughter', part of the winning reserves side in 2007-08 and who made a big impact last season.



5. Faye Birkby

Defender
Born 30 November 1992
Faye was one of the breakthrough players from the 2009-2010 season's reserves side, when she was voted Reserves Player of the Year.



7. Emma Lipman

Midfielder
Born 23 February 1989
Emma signed towards the end of 2010 from cross-city rivals Vixens. and has quickly settled in to the heart of the Leeds back four or midfield.



8. Clare Sykes - Captain

Midfielder
Born 14 December 1984
Captain Clare also joined Leeds in the summer of 2010, and brings experience to the central midfield and, when needed, into the back four.



9. Carey Huegett

Forward
Born 23 July 1991
'Kez' joined the Centre of Excellence at the age of 8, eventually joining the successful reserves side when only 15 years old. A stylish and skilful player, Kez was a key member of the reserves league and County Cup-winning teams of 2007-08 and 2008-09.



10. Tanya Rich

Forward
Born 5 December 1984
Last season's top scorer, Tanya came through the ranks at Leeds and was a member of the all-conquering reserves team in 2007-08 before leaving to gain experience elsewhere. She has now revived her partnership with Huegett at the front of the Leeds formation.



11. Leah Galton

Midfielder
Born 24 May 1994
Leah is the youngest member of the squad, but still has a wealth of footballing experience under her belt, having become an England regular while still at Leeds Girl's Centre of Excellence.



12. Bekki Bass

Midfielder
Born 16 May 1994
Bekki was one of three 16 year olds who joined the squad last year, having graduated from North Yorkshire's Centre of Excellence.



14. Sarah Danby

Midfielder
Born 7 April 1991
A tricky left winger who joined Leeds from Manchester City in the summer of 2011. A former Sunderland WFC Player, Sarah will be another good addition to the squad. Sarah studies at Leeds Metropolitan University and has represented England Universities in 2010 and also Great Britain at the World University Games in China in 2011.



15. Vanessa Holmes

Defender
Born 29 September 1984
Vanessa was another of Chris Welburn's first signings in July 2011. She brings with her a wealth of Premier League experience, having played top-flight football for most of her career.



16. Emma Johnson

Midfielder
Born 12 October 1991
Emma was one of Chris Welburn's first signings in July 2011. A fast, versatile and pacy player.



17. Amy Turner

Defender
Born 4 July 1991
Amy joined Leeds in August 2011 from Super League side Doncaster Rovers Belles, before which she had played in the US while a student at Hofstra University. She has been involved with the England U15 and U17 squads and will now be looking to continue her development while now playing at a higher level.



18. Billie Murphy

Defender
Born 27 January 1993
Billie is a summer signing for Leeds, having previously played for and captained Arsenal Ladies Reserves.



19. Millie Bright

Forward
Born 21 August 1993
Millie joins Leeds from Doncaster Rovers Belles as one of two dual signings. a strong, athletic forward who is dual signed with ourselves and FAWSL side Doncaster Belles. A product of the Sheffield United Centre of Excellence, Millie will be looking to make an impact with us over the next couple of months.



20 Jess Holbrook

Midfielder
Born 1 August 1992
Jess started her career at Everton Centre of Excellence where she competed in both the Under-14s and Under-16s age groups. She then went on to make her full debut in the 2008/2009 season against Millwall. She ruptured her ACL while playing for England Under-20s in 2010, and is making a return to fitness after 8 months out.



International news

Current and former Leeds United Ladies players have been playing for England this week.

In front of a crowd of just under 5,000 hardy souls who braved a chill late November evening in Doncaster, Leeds-born Jess Clarke opened the scoring as England cruised to an uneventful 2-0 victory over Serbia in their Euro 2013 qualification tie.

The second goal came from another 'old girl', Ellen White, scoring from close range after Karen Carney's shot was blocked.

Also playing the full 90 minutes was Sophie Bradley, while Steph Houghton came on as a second-half sub; Laura Bassett was on the bench, with Jade Moore included in the full squad.

And watching from the stands were four former players (at least), our last two managers and the previous Secretary, so it was almost like a home game!

Leeds 1-1 Forest Sunday 13 November

A 93rd minute Millie Bright equaliser helped Leeds escape with a point in an entertaining clash with Nottingham Forest at Throstle Nest on Sunday.

The game started out in frantic fashion as Leeds fashioned perhaps their best chance of the game almost straight from the kickoff as Tanya Rich capitalised on some sloppy Forest defending to cross for the

incoming Leah Galton who at full stretch was unlucky not to see her left foot poke find the bottom left hand corner of the net.

Despite dominating most of the first half possession Leeds were unable to find a way past a dogged and well organised Forest defence. In fact it was Forest's incisive counter attacking play that looked the most likely way to find an opening goal. In particular forward Andrea Bell had two

glorious opportunities to open the scoring as she twice found herself clean through on goal only to be denied by some wonderful goalkeeping from home stopper Jules Draycott.

Following the half time break Leeds came out with renewed enthusiasm but despite their continuous pressure were unable to find a breakthrough. In fact it was the visitors who took an unlikely lead when in the 61st minute forward Aileen Whelan

timed a late run into the box to perfection to dispatch a clinical volley into the opposite corner from a Natasha Meade free kick.

As Leeds threw extra players forward in search of an equaliser Forest almost wrapped up all three points in the 81st minute as Whelan somehow found some space on the edge of the box and was unlucky to see her well struck left foot shot crash agonizingly back off the bar.

Despite the obvious frustration from a difficult afternoon, Leeds desire never wavered and in the 93rd minute substitute Millie Bright finally found a way past a tired Forest back four to earn the home side a share of the spoils. The goal was clinically taken as the forward collected a well worked Leah Galton cross with her back to goal before swivelling to fire a clinical drive into the bottom left hand corner of the net.

Speaking after the game Leeds manager Chris Welburn was relieved to have taken something from the game. "Fair play to Forest for today's performance," he said. "They defended really well and some of their counter attacks were impressive, particularly in the

first half. In the second half we were better and brighter and ultimately deserved our goal. We definitely need to be a bit more organised at the back, particularly on set pieces, but we kept battling right to the final minute and I think definitely deserved something from the game."

Leeds 5-0 Huddersfield Sunday 20 November

Three first half goals helped Leeds United Ladies progress to the quarter final stage of the West Riding County Cup.

Although Leeds had much the better of play throughout the game, Huddersfield held them off until the 23rd minute, when Jess Holbrook fashioned a 40-yard left-to-right pass to Sarah Danby, who played the ball through for Carey Huegett to drive into the box and fire home.

Leeds continued to put Town keeper Laura Carter under pressure, eventually doubling the lead when Emma Johnson spectacularly lobbed Carter from 18 yards out, wide on the left.

While Carter could have prevented the second goal she was at fault for the third, three

minutes later, when she failed to hold on to a fierce shot from Emma Lipman and allowed the ball to spill from her hands and bounce over the goal-line.

Yet Carter was also the key to stopping Leeds turning the game into a rout, as she pulled off a string of saves midway through the second half; and although Lipman got her second with another thumping strike in the 58th minute, it wasn't until the 83rd that Danby completed the scoring when a wildly spinning ball evaded everyone, running through to the far post for her to prod home from a few yards out.

"I'm pleased that, as defending champions, we're through to the last eight," said Leeds manager Chris Welburn. "Huddersfield Town acquitted themselves well, and provided us with a stern test for the full 90 minutes, as you'd expect from a side doing as well as they are this season. I only wish them the best for the rest of the season.

Today's opponents

The club was formed in 2000 when Croydon Ladies, who had the previous season won the League and F.A. Cup double, came under the umbrella of the Addicks.

Charlton picked up their first piece of silverware at the start of the 2000/01 campaign sharing the Charity Shield with Arsenal and went on to finish 3rd in the league.

In 2002/03 the club reach its first F.A. Cup final losing 3-0 to the 'professional' Fulham team.

Charlton recruited a number of England Internationals and the 2003/04 season went right to the wire with Arsenal pipping the Addicks to the title by one point in the final game. Charlton were again FA Cup finalists losing to Arsenal. However the Addicks lifted their first major trophy beating Fulham 1-0 in the League Cup Final.

Charlton avenged their FA Cup Final defeat in the 2004/05 Community Shield defeating the Gunners 1-0 but again finished league runners-up to Arsenal.

2004/05 finished in celebration for the Addicks as they finally put their FA Cup Final heartache behind them beating Everton 1-0 with an Eniola Aluko goal. The Women's first FA Cup Final victory fittingly coming in Charlton Athletic's Centenary season.

2005/06 commenced with defeat by Arsenal in the Community Shield and the Addicks finished third in the league. Success came in regaining the League Cup from Arsenal with a 2-1 victory with both goals from Eniola Aluko. Arsenal got revenge knocking Charlton out in the FA Cup semi-final scoring in the final seconds of extra-time. More

success came for the Addicks in the London FA Cup in a thrilling 4-3 victory over Arsenal.

In 2006/07 disappointing results saw the Addicks dream of a place in Europe disappear as they finished third. Charlton reached the FA Cup Final and in front 25,000 at Nottingham Forest took an early lead against Arsenal before going down 4-1.

Following the relegation of the men's team from the Premiership in 2006/07 it was a difficult summer for the Women and Girls section of the club. Several months of hard work and negotiation secured sponsorship to support the female section of the club with Centre Circle Management Limited provided the finance necessary to re-establish the women's first team. The Women's team, Academy and Centre of Excellence moved under the umbrella of the Charlton Athletic Community Trust.

Former Charlton Athletic midfielder Paul Mortimer took over as Technical Director but with the loss of almost all of the established players the Addicks were not surprisingly relegated at the end of 2007/08 after eight successive seasons in the National Division.

2008/09 saw the Addicks challenge to regain their National Division status but after an impressive start their inexperience told and they finished as disappointing fourth. However the Reserve team was re-established and they met with

success with a resounding win over Millwall in the Kent Cup final.

The Women's and Girls teams continue to progress and a generous donation from Warmby Services Limited, continued support from the Charlton Community Trust and fund raising from the players and parents provide a good financial foundation for the club. Additionally Cohesion Design sponsor the Women's Reserve Team.

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Forming part of the Leeds United Girls Centre of Excellence is the Under 13s team.

The under 13s currently have 15 girls registered; the girls train twice a week with a game on a Saturday. The recent changes in the GCOE national set up means the scope for excellence is prevalent; the ethics is to positively develop each individual player to reach their own maximum potential within the long term athlete development programme as well hitting all aspects in the FA's Four Corner model. Our hope with the under 13s is that we can influence and shape each players development through the centre and progress to represent the ladies first team and hopefully to represent on an international stage!

The season so far has been extremely successful, there has clearly been development taken place in training and this has been displayed through their performances on a Saturday. The under 13s are currently undefeated bar one tough encounter against Manchester United the first game of the season, the girls displayed a great performance by gaining a 3-0 lead, to sadly be defeated 4-3. The reaction of the girls from this game was tremendous by going on to be undefeated to date. In terms of performances all the girls have been displaying high quality in all aspects of the game putting into practice the individual skills and techniques highlighted during training as well a great overall team spirit and cohesion.



The under 13s training schedule is heavily based on building on from the fundamental movement patterns that were developed in the under 11s to make them much more fluid and dynamic. A lot of attention at training and been to development basic principles of the game to make the players more receptive in a game. This month's training has been heavily dominated by aspects of defending; we started the girl's basic principles of individual aspects of defending and gradually developed in to defending with pairs eventually to defensive team shape. For every monthly coaching topic, specific trigger words are used to help the girls retain information; it can also be used to measure the amount of learning taken place. The specific keys words for the girls this month were; compact, delay / engage, slide, cover, body shape. These key principals have been displayed by all the girls during their game time and they have been disciplined to maintain the correct defending principals, showing evidence of learning and

reproducing. Christmas marks a good point of the season for the coaches to evaluate the performances of training and matches, these mid-season appraisals give the coaches a good opportunity evaluate players and also to receive feedback from the players. The appraisals are based around the FA's models of "Four Corners" it's designed to challenge the technique, psychological, physical and social aspects of the player's development. Ensuring that the players are developing all aspects the four corner model is essential to producing an all-round athlete. Progress of all the players to date has been extremely encouraging, the aim now is to challenge and progress the girls to the end of the season, where hopefully they will be retained by the club, with some players moving on to the next stage of their development; the under 15s.

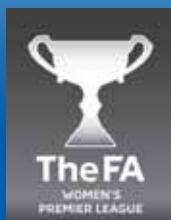
